# Executive Report 2019/2020

2019/2020 year ups and downs. Regular programs were running well. River Skate 2020 February 1st and 2nd, 2020 had been a successful competition. There was an assessment day scheduled for March 21st, 2020, which had been a goal for several months given changes in evaluator certification requirements. Planning for the March 29th, 2020 Ice Show, Drop the Mic, was well underway. It was the second year the show was to take place at Merlis Belsher Place. The registration response to the April 4th and 5th, 2020 seminar with Elvis Stojko (3-time World Champion, 2-time Olympic Silver Medalist and 7time Canadian Champion) and his wife Gladys Orozco had been met with overwhelming enthusiasm.

The Hall rental activity was continuing to gain good traction. Single skaters off-ice was provided for winter 2019/2020 in the hall with arrangements directly between the facilitator and skater(s) again. Three of the synchro teams also held off- ice in the hall during winter 2019/2020.

As a result of Covid-19 Skate Saskatoon was closed abruptly March 16th, 2020. The upcoming Assessment Day, Drop the Mic and Spring School 2020 were cancelled. The Elvis Stojko seminar was deferred. The club remained closed until the week of June 29th, at which time there was a soft reopening ahead of Summer School, which commenced July 6th, in order to ensure everything was running smoothly with the Covid-19 protocol. To date we are very pleased that this has remained the case.

During summer 2020 the club had a hall rental arrangement with the Boys & Girls Club where they held a summer day camp for nine weeks. The management of Boys & Girls Club were extremely satisfied with the facility and the rental arrangement ran very smoothly. We are optimistic that this arrangement can continue in future summers. Under normal circumstances this could run in tandem with off-ice.

The club has spent significant time and effort in order to achieve the primary goal of keeping the facility safe. Careful consideration has been given to the fluid requirements imposed by Skate Canada and several levels of government in order to implement, execute and modify the ongoing protocol needed to ensure compliance. The club's key goals during the Covid-19 era are minimization of risk while continuing to viably run valuable skating programs and provide skating opportunities, altered as necessary to meet regulation requirements.

We look forward to local assessment days again. The format will be tailored accordingly.

The 2021 Ice Show will not run in its conventional format. In the absence of an Ice Show and competitions the club is looking at the possibility of a performance event that could take place within our facility while remaining compliant with all current provincial Covid-19 guidelines. The Section will be providing related information to assist.

Skate Saskatoon's board had many months of special board meetings to address regulations, required protocol, program modifications, schedule logistics and other special circumstance topics as a result of Covid-19. Regular

business items had to be deferred. More recently regular business items are able to be given attention again, which is encouraging.

The club continues to operate with a small board, which has resulted in high demand for board members, especially given current circumstances. We would ask members to give consideration to participating in this capacity or on a committee of interest. Although this is a challenging time to get involved the board and executive have excellent communication, which is rewarding.

A strategic planning session is on the action plan for the club. Involvement in this type of process allows an opportunity to provide input in relation to the club's short- and long-term goals.

The dedication of our coaches, program coordinators and operations team at Skate Saskatoon is greatly appreciated. The current situation underscores the significant benefits of strong team work.

On behalf of the executive of Skate Saskatoon our sincere thanks for your support of the club. We look forward to continuing to work together to move out of the Covid-19 era successfully.



#### CANSKATE REPORT (2019-20) submitted by Blaise Kirchgesner & Neil Tymoruski (co-ordinators)

This was the 4th year that we co-ordinated the CanSkate program. There were no programming changes implemented by the Skate Canada National Office.

#### FALL 2019 (September)

The CanSkate sessions in Fall were offered on Mondays and Wednesdays (5:45 – 6:30 PM). This is a wonderful "short-term" way of having people experiment with the program, and then sign up for the winter season, which is much longer. Each September we try to recruit as many Program Assistants as possible, and hold a brief training session at the end of September. We then encourage them to sign up for the Winter sessions.

#### WINTER 2019-20 (October - March)

The Winter 2019-20 registration process was again divided into two terms (Oct – Dec and Jan – March). We believe that this split registration process enhances the numbers as it does not seem so financially intimidating. The winter program (again) consisted of 8 sessions per week – each session skated 11 times before Christmas and 11 times after Christmas. The 11<sup>th</sup> session was "family skate" and progress report hand out day. The "testing" days were held on sessions 7, 8, and 9. For term 1 on the 3<sup>rd</sup> session, all parents were invited to attend a "parent information meeting" which included a handout. The same process occurred during term 2. The handout was also emailed to every participant and posted throughout the rink. Despite the information, we continue to see an alarming amount of plastic skates, poorly tied skates, and inappropriate protective gear. All of the Club Coaches were involved with coach CanSkate, and we had to hire several replacement coaches. There continues to be a struggle with finding Program Assistants, no matter what incentive is presented. If the CanSkaters are capable, we provide them with an information letter/invitation to move up to Advanced PreSTAR/STAR 1 & 2. This invitation is generally given between sessions 1-4 for term 1 and term 2. We find that this invitation has worked well for moving skaters from CanSkate to Advanced. The Advanced Co-ordinator and the Office is made aware of who receives the invitation so that the proper registration can be done.

We were already in the planning stages when the rink was shut down March 16 due to covid. The sessions remaining were the family skates and the ice show. The skater had the opportunity to receive their report cards during 4 pick-up sessions in the summer.

#### ADVANCED PRESTAR 1&2 REPORT

#### 2019-2020 SEASON

#### SUBMITTED BY PADGET RIEDIGER

The Winter Season of the Advanced PreStar 1&2 was another successful one in my opinion. I feel as a whole we saw a wonderful increase in skating ability throughout the season with another big increase in the number of skaters for Term 2.

The Advanced PreStar 1&2 Program is filled with skaters working on Stage 4-6 badges within the age range of 5-15 and new this year the addition of skaters working on Star 1 & 2. In comparison to the Canskate Program; the Program has been slightly modified to include more aspects of figure skating to introduce the skaters to what figure skating is really about and not just a learn to skate program. Again we saw a decline in the total enrollment skating more than one day which is so important for a quicker progress within the program. The more they skate the quicker they progress. This is down for a second year in a row. I'm not sure what the problem or solution to this situation is.

We have a class on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturdays. The main coaches for this program are Padget Riediger, Sandra Nicholat, Dale Hazel, and Rosemary Armstrong and Blaise Kirchgesner. Neil Tymoruski assisted when needed.

I have a specific lesson plan which I make up every week for all groups and levels. I make sure I discuss with the other coaches what they feel is needed for every group that they work with to make sure I can focus on the needs and weaknesses of the skaters while giving them a rounded education of figure skating while at the same time making them better all around skaters.

The program consists of a regular structured stroking and warm up for about 13 minutes done to music with many different tasks being covered within this time frame. Once completed we do attendance and then break up into smaller groups by badge levels with ages being a factor within the badge levels. They begin with work on edge development which will consist of turns and edge exercises which I have specifically laid out for each group.

We will then go into more of a Freeskate portion of the lesson in which we cover Spiral, Drags, Spins and Jumps according to each badge level. We will also cover basics in dance steps to give them a start on the basic terminology of a few beginner steps and how they are done. The lesson plans are very specific as to what is to be done each day.



Once this is done we have approximately 5 minutes of group instruction time remaining in which we review the elements that were instructed the previous week with the skaters.

We do official testing for badges in December and again in March in which Progress Reports Cards and badges are handed out to each skater.

This Year with Covid cancelling all programs as of March 15<sup>th</sup> we were unable to host the family skate week in which we hand out all of the progress report cards. There were a couple of days set aside in the summer and fall in which this was offered for parents to come and collect the sheets. Others will be handed out in the Term 1 of the winter season of Advanced PreStar in 2020.

This year again was broken up in to Term 1 (Oct-Dec) and Term 2 (Jan-March). The registration for Term 1 was 77 up slightly from 73 skaters last year with 14 skaters skating more than 1 time per week (up from 11 last year). Monday was at 19 skaters, Wednesday 22, Thursday 25 and Saturday was at 27 skaters. A total of 22 skaters passed Stage 4, 3 Skaters passed Stage 5 and 8 Skaters passed Stage 6 at the end of Term 1.

Term 2 was down to a total of 87 skaters registered compared to 105 last year. 12 skaters attended more than 1 time per week (slightly down from 14 last year). Monday was at 15 skaters, Wednesday 30, Thursday 27 and Saturday was at 30 skaters. A total of 16 Skaters passed Stage 4, 19 Skaters passed Stage 5 and 4 Skaters passed Stage 6. We did not do any testing for the Star 1&2 skaters as they would be tested in their private lessons with their own coach. For Term 1 we had 22 Skaters in the Star 1&2 Group. Term 2 we had 20 skaters in the Star 1&2 Group.

With having the Star 1&2 skaters in the Advanced PreStar program I feel it was very beneficial for them to have some group structure. They were able to take part in a great comprehensive warm up stroking and then broke off to their own level of grouping. They concentrated on Skills and Dance as their freeskate would be taken care of from their personal private lesson coach. They were a huge asset to us when it came to the ice show as we had strong leaders for our groups and great mentors to the weaker skaters.

Overall I feel the winter session was a great success. Sadly we were unable to have the ice show due to Covid, but from skaters indications we would have had a good attendance of skaters participating in the show.

For the Spring Session we were unable to host the Advanced PreStar due to cancellation of all skating due to Covid.

We did run a small 1 session Fall session in 2019 held on Tuesdays. There were 18 skaters in total. No testing was done as there were only 4 classes.



#### Suggestions:

I know there are still skaters that were encouraged to jump out of the Advanced PreStar program and move strictly into private lessons. Again I feel it is important that all skaters should move up through the program and this way keep the numbers alive within the program. The great instruction in so many areas within the program is essential to a well-rounded learning experience that will only benefit the skaters in the long run. With having the Star 1&2 skaters stay within the program the skaters finishing the Stage 6 had a place to stay and reap the benefits from a great program. Encouraging them to pull out of the program too early not only hurts the program but also the skaters. We can also have more coaches on the ice working as this is for most of us our main source of employment and therefore every hour counts.

## REPORT FOR ADULT SKATE (2019-20) by Blaise Kirchgesner

The idea of having a designated adult skating session had been tried before, but having it at a regular date and time starting in November 2018 was met with good success. Every year there were inquiries about adult skating, and we had encouraged them to try CanSkate. Unfortunately, due to the busyness of the session, this is challenging and fearful for the adults.

For the 2019-2020 Winter season the program continued to be set up based on purchase of a ten-session ticket to provide flexibility in which Saturdays the registrant can skate. Once the ticket is fully used another ticket can be purchased. The role of the paid coach supervisor was to provide "guided – instructional – supervision." It was not his/her job to provide direct individual or group instruction, but to provide tips or small amounts of help where needed.

In the 2019-2020 year there were 15 registrations. There was a wide range in age and ability.



#### STAR and Competitive Report 2019-2020 Season

#### STAR:

The STAR program had a successful River Skate competition at ACT (see Riverskate report). The numbers in the STAR program are trending downwards, with the majority of skaters at the STAR 3 or lower level.

#### Competitive:

The number of competitive skaters at Skate Saskatoon continues to decrease, of particular concern is the Pre-Juvenile and Juvenile levels which had only 8 participants from Skate Saskatoon at Sectionals.

## Synchro report for 2019-2020 season

Our season started out very well.

We had 6 teams again this year, which consisted of the following levels:
Beginner 2 with 11 skaters
Pre-Juvenile with 9 skaters
Juvenile with 12 skaters (10 full skaters 2 double team skaters from Pre-Juvenile)
Pre-Novice with 10 skaters
Adult 2 with 13 skaters
Open with 18 skaters (14 full time and 4 double team skaters from Pre-Novice)
It was great to see so many full teams and that our programs are continuing to grow.

We started our season off by having our usual open houses in the first two weeks of September. This then lead into our choreo weekend with the St.Cyr sisters from Calgary. This nicely set us up for our programs for the year.

Competitions and results that we attended included the following:

Calgary Rose Bowl - Dec 13, 2019 three teams attended. Pre-Novice finished 2nd Adult 2 finished 3rd Open finished 3rd

Prairie Regionals in Killarney Manitoba Feb 2020 four teams attended. Pre-Juvenile finished 1st Juvenile finished 3rd Pre-Novice 1st Open finished 2nd

The Beginner 2 team skated at River Skate 2020 hosted by Skate Saskatoon.

We had all six teams planning to attend the Regina Living Skies Competition on March 13-14th weekend. This competition was cancelled at the last minute due to the start of COVID-19 within the province.

All of our teams placed very well at each of the competitions and the growing strength and quality of our club as a whole in regard to synchro is definitely being noticed at the judging level through their comments during feedback sessions. Our Pre-Novice team was able to hold onto their first-place title for the second year in a row, being the Sask/Manitoba champions.



Due to the cancellation of the Ice Show we were unable to perform like the rest of the other Skate Saskatoon Members. This was disappointing as it is always a great way to finish off our season on a high note!

As a coach I was invited and attended the National Synchro Championships in Calgary in their first coach Mentor program hosted by Skate Alberta. It was an amazing experience and opportunity to see and hear everything firsthand from both the coaching and judging technical side of things.

Three of our team being the Pre-Novice, Open, and Adult 2 teams continued to rent the upstairs hall again this year to do our off-ice dry land training sessions. This has been a great help having opportunity to use this space so we can do both on ice and off-ice in the same building.

We had planned to have synchro skills sessions in spring season but due to the closure of the rink we were unable to have these sessions. We are optimistic that these might be in our future.



# <u>REPORT FROM BLAISE KIRCHGESNER – Stroking</u> <u>Sessions (Sunday) for the 2019-2020 Season</u>

REGISTRATION: Sunday 2:15 – 3:00 PM; 15 skaters registered; average 11.2 skaters per session; 24 sessions in the season.

This is my 11<sup>th</sup> year teaching the stroking sessions. Each year, the number of registrations has varied. The stroking session is 45 minutes in length. The sessions incorporate turns, edges, speed, jumps, spins, figures, field moves, rhythm, timing, group skating, synchro., stations, endurance, and stretching. We also utilized pylons, hockey sticks, hoola hoops, benches, and podiums.

The numbers were fairly consistent throughout the season, but do not include a number of skaters that signed-on. The skaters in this stroking group generally ranged from Advanced CanSkate to PreSTAR 1-2 (Junior/Senior Bronze). The placement of the Session is wonderful because the skaters have an open option before and after the stroking session. Although there is a wonderful social aspect to this program, the underlying goal is to improve the overall skating quality.

# Skate Saskatoon Assessment Day Committee Annual Report July 2019-June 2020

- \* Committee members: Teresa Schmautz, Lori Lisitza, Jodie Lacelle, Blaise Kirchgesner, Nicole Sereda, Carmen Allen
- \* In late 2019, Senior Bronze to Gold tests were phased out and STAR 6 to Gold assessments were introduced by Skate Canada. The term "test" was changed to "assessment."
- \* The Skate Saskatoon Test Day Committee was renamed "Skate Saskatoon Assessment Day Committee" in Fall 2019.
- \* In October 2019, Skate Canada Saskatchewan specified that future requests for assessment days must be submitted by Regional Coordinators rather than by individual clubs. Nicole Sereda, Region 9 Coordinator, will request assessment dates on behalf of Skate Saskatoon.
- \* In fiscal year 2019-2020, Skate Saskatoon coaches assessed 142 STAR 1-5 tests (42.3% decrease from previous year).
- \* One test day was held for Senior Bronze and higher levels (August 2019).
- \* An assessment day was not granted in December 2019 due to a Skate Canada delay in rolling out the new STAR 6-Gold assessments and training assessors.
- \* Skate Saskatoon's March 2020 assessment day was cancelled because of rink closure due to the COVID-19 lockdown.
- \* In October 2019, certificates of achievement were presented to 27 skaters who completed an entire level in STAR 1-5 in 2018-2019. Certificates were awarded to 14 skaters for passing test levels in at least one discipline at the Senior Bronze level or higher during the past year.

#### **Region 9 Report 2019/2020**

Please continue to consult <a href="www.skatecanadasaskatchewan.com">www.skatecanadasaskatchewan.com</a> for updated info regarding skating in Saskatchewan. This has links to all upcoming events including competitions, meetings, assessment days, etc. throughout the province as well as info on Sask Sport/Safe Sport. There is also access to Awards nominations for all skaters, coaches and volunteers. Nominate as many people as you'd like. Awards may be given out at annual ice shows/carnivals.

The section has now included a new \$30 'Fundraising Adjustment Fee' to all Skate Canada registered skaters. Each club is to keep track of their number of skaters. The \$30/skating member is to be invoiced out in early January to cover the bulk of our skaters and then again quarterly to cover anyone who was missed or hadn't registered yet. This year, the second invoice will not be issued to any club. Excerpt of April 6 letter from Section Chairperson Carla Laevens: With changes to the Skaters' Lottery, to balance the budget and to secure funding for skating programs, a motion was passed at the March 28<sup>th</sup>, 2020 Board Meeting to continue the Fundraising Adjustment Fee of \$30.00 per registrant (Skate Canada registered member) with the exception of Club Executive Members (maximum five(5)), Officials and Section Board Members. Clubs must classify their board correctly; this isn't for those who randomly volunteer.

There will be an informational Ice Conference(formerly known as the Club Development Seminar) in October 2020. Every club should send representatives to take part.

It is important to consider bidding for and hosting the annual Road Show in your community. This is a really great chance to see our local and provincial stars exhibit their talents while keeping our sport highly visible in our province.

The Skate Canada Saskatchewan Annual General Meeting was held online on Zoom on May 2. This new format came with a few hiccups but overall ran very smoothly with over 150 'attendees'.

Telephone Club Survey — This was done by J. Fritter. Basically, we need better communication with and through our Regional Coordinators. However, it's always okay to contact the section office with questions and concerns. It was suggested that we develop a communication methodology to ensure the correct information is received by all clubs. Canada Skate Ice Summit for May 29-30 in Moncton has been cancelled. Skate Canada will hold their AGM online on May 30, 2020. Information was included in the latest version of 'Inside Edge'.

The Anne Collingridge FSC is not likely to be able to have an upcoming skating season as their arena, Merlis Belsher Place, has been set up as the COVID-19 overflow field hospital should the need arise.
